Sustainable Overlook, a committee of the Overlook Neighborhood

Neighborhood project. The five gardens featured showcase a diverse mix of landscape styles
and functions, all maintained without the use of toxic chemicals. These gardens represent ways
we can connect with our neighbors, the seasons and the earth by offering space to grow food,
gather with friends and family, create habitat and increase diversity and resilience. Please enjoy
the gardens today and take advantage of the experienced and passionate gardeners you will meet
by learning something new about natural gardening.

Sustainable Overlook is a group of volunteers working to build community and make our neighborhood more sustainable. As a Transition Initiative, we are using positive, local approaches to foster resilience in the face of climate change, energy descent, economic instability and natural disaster.

The Gardens

Trillium Charter School has the only rooftop school garden in Portland. Their organic garden offers hands-on learning and provides food for the school cafeteria. A recent grant from the East Multnomah Soil and Water Conservation District engaged students in pollinator conservation to plant a new garden to attract native bees and other beneficial insects.

10–11am Kid's Garden Activity

When **Gabriele** and her family moved to Overlook last spring, they inherited a mature—but neglected—garden and a large back lawn. Since then, they took the Pesticide-Free Overlook pledge, improved their soil with organic compost, dug two rain gardens, and built raised beds for vegetables and native plants. The front planting strip is edged with reclaimed tree rounds that retain moisture. They are adding native plants throughout the yard, including meadow flowers in the rain gardens and planting strip. They hope to attract monarchs with native milkweed and insects and birds with a diversity of native shrubs.

11am-12pm Mason Bee Demonstration

Josephine's cottage garden is an eclectic mix of ornamentals, edibles and natives. It changes season by season, but retains an emphasis on sustainable practices such as composting and careful plant selection that encourages birds, butterflies and beneficial insects. No pesticides have been used on the site for over 20 years. Gardening is Josephine's personal therapeutic passion and she believes our yards are the perfect place to honor the earth, feed our families and preserve nature though thoughtful choices and a deepened relationship with the earth.

The Attunement Center is Joelle's permaculture homestead. It is a landscape of useful, multipurpose elements: edible and medicinal plants, a flock of 10 chickens to improve the soil, cycle nutrients and provide eggs, a colony of honeybees that pollinate crops and provide honey. Utilizing organic gardening practices, the center is creating a space for the community to get hands-on experience in gardening with perennials, medicinals, mycelium, worms, composting, sheet mulching, natural building, water management, permaculture, food preservation and herbal medicine-making.

Its mature landscape surrounds an old Portland house where you will find large blueberry bushes, vegetable garden beds, rain gardens and winding paths.
